The Orange Order is an international Masonic-style fraternity founded in 1795, named as a tribute to Protestant king William of Orange, who defeated the army of Catholic king James II in the late 1600s.

Members are known as "Orangemen" and the order is most widely known for its annual marches, the largest of which is held each year on (or around, if the date is on a Sunday) July $12^{\rm th}$, "The Twelfth", and marks the anniversary of King William's victory over King James at the Battle of the Boyne in 1690.



The order is headed by the Grand Orange Lodge of Ireland, but has lodges in England, the U.S. and elsewhere, including Scotland. Incidentally, it was recently reported in the media that, due to COVID19, the Grand Orange Lodge of Scotland planned to hold a "virtual 12th" this year.

The vessel was named after Revolutionary War naval commander John Paul Jones' famous frigate, which he had renamed in honor of the U.S. Ambassador to France at the time, Benjamin Franklin. Franklin's popular *Poor Richard's Almanack* was published in France under the title *Les Maximes du Bonhomme Richard*.

Franklin also attended meetings of the infamous Hellfire Club during his time in England.
